<p>Bill Number: H.R. 2278</p> <p>Title: Strengthen and Fortify Enforcement (SAFE) Act</p> <p>Sponsor: Trey Gowdy (R-S.C.)</p> <p>Date of Introduction: June 6, 2013</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ❖ Grants states and localities the ability to enforce federal and state immigration laws, so long as they are consistent with federal laws <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ Withholds grants from sanctuary cities ❖ Facilitates and expedites removal of criminal aliens ❖ Expands the Visa Security Program to additional high risk posts; authorizes Department of Homeland Security & State Department to revoke visas if in the security or foreign policy interests of the U.S ❖ Extends the authority of ICE officers to include arrests for immigration violations, federal felonies, federal criminal offenses for bringing in and harboring unlawful immigrants, and offenses against the U.S. ❖ Requires an annual report to Congress regarding the abuse of prosecutorial discretion by the Administration ❖ Prohibits the Department of Interior and Agriculture from preventing Border Patrol agents access to lands within 100 miles of the border ❖ Bars illegal immigrants who threaten national security from becoming naturalized
